The Public Issues CSP is pleased to announce that **Rob Christensen** (correspondent and columnist,

Raleigh News & Observer) will be the guest speaker for our meeting on October 13.

His topic "What are the 2016 Elections telling us so far?" is bound to be thought-provoking.

Rob Christensen has been writing about North Carolina politics as a

reporter and columnist for *The News & Observer* for 43 years. He has appeared on more than 550 TV or radio programs to comment on politics, including the CBS Evening News, MSNBC's Hardball with Chris Matthews, ABC's Nightline, The PBS NewsHour with Jim Lehrer, CNN's Crossfire, and Happening Now on Fox News.

In 2008, UNC Press published his history, *The Paradox of Tar Heel Politics*, which won an award as the best work of non-fiction published

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in the state that year by the N.C. Literary and Historical Association. He is completing work on another book on North Carolina's Scott family dynasty. He has also contributed to four other books about life and politics in the South and in North Carolina.

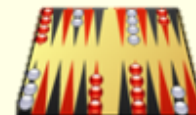

International Outreach: Oct. 11th, International Day of the Girl Child



Let's recognize and celebrate this day in October! *October 11 – International Day of the Girl Child*

On this day, the United Nations recognizes girls' rights and the unique challenges girls face around the world.

Why? Girls face discrimination and violence every day across the world. The International Day of the Girl Child focuses attention on the need to address the challenges girls face and to

promote girls' empowerment and the fulfillment of their human rights.

Did you know...

- Worldwide, more than 700 million women were married as children (below 18 years of age). More than one in three – or some 250 million – were married before 15. And child brides are often unable to effectively negotiate safe sex, leaving them vulnerable to sexually transmitted infections and unwanted pregnancy.
- Every 10 minutes, somewhere in the world, an adolescent girl dies as a result of violence.
- In emergencies, adolescent girls are especially vulnerable to sexual violence, and in some cases, are abducted and exploited for sexual purposes by armed groups.
- Nearly half (44%) of adolescent girls worldwide aged 15 to 19 think a husband or partner is justified in hitting or beating his wife or partner under certain circumstances.

How to commemorate? Promote **zero tolerance** against physical, mental, and sexual violence. (Source:

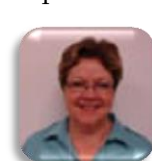
Membership CSP
