Putting the Pollinator Garden to Bed!

We will meet at the Page-Walker Pollinator Garden to "put it to bed for the winter" on **Friday**, **November 13 and Friday**, **November 20 at 9:30 a.m. each day**. We will work for no more than 2 hours each day. The Cary Garden Club members will also be helping. So please let me know which day you plan to help, because the town is limiting the number of volunteers who can be on-site at the same time. Please wear a mask, and bring work gloves, trowel, and clippers if you have them. We will be cutting back dead plants, pruning, and planting pansies for spring color. We will also spread mulch on the path on the 20th. On both days, we will be thinning plants, so if you want to take some home, please bring your own pots. We will also be potting up some plants to sell at Herb Fest the first Sat. in May—hopefully, we will be back to a regular schedule by then. This plant sale helps to fund new plants for the garden in the spring.

Planting Longleaf Pine Tree Seedlings at the Cary Tree Archive

On Saturday, November 21 at 10:00 am, we will be working with Scenic NC and the Cary Garden Club on this project to add Longleaf Pine tree seedlings to the Cary Tree Archive. Since our members already planted trees there in the spring, we won't actually have to plant trees this time. But we do need two or three of our members to sell some Longleaf grass-stage tree seedlings to the public, which will help to fund the Cary Tree Archive. And you are welcome to come buy seedlings too for your own yard. The Cary Tree Archive is across Cary Parkway from the Taylor Family YMCA. Park at the Y. Both of these projects come under the Environment (formerly Conservation) CSP.
